Spotlight on Sport



Letter Regarding Influenza Vaccination

Dear Parents,

This year our public hospitals are preparing themselves for a serious flu season. In New Zealand our flu patterns follow the Northern Hemisphere, and this year they have had a severe epidemic due to a particular strain of flu (H3N2). It has caused much more serious sickness and death than in recent seasons.

The flu is not just a cold, it is a very unpleasant, prolonged illness that can kill even healthy people. Most at risk of a severe response are young children, pregnant woman, the elderly, and people with some existing medical illnesses (eg asthma).

Getting the flu vaccine, and staying home if you're sick, are two of the most important ways to reduce the spread of the virus. Children should stay away from school for at least 24 hours after a fever has gone. If in doubt, please stay away from school a little longer. It's also important to remind our children to wash their hands often, and to cover their mouths when they cough or sneeze.

School staff have already been offered the vaccine, as have all healthcare workers. We all hope to avoid a repeat of the 2008/9 flu season in NZ, during which our hospitals overflowed, some schools had days with 90% of children away sick, and we suffered several deaths. As our flu season follows the Northern hemisphere season, we have the advantage of a vaccine adjusted to target the H3N2 flu strain.

Please consider the flu vaccination for your family. It is better to do this early rather than wait until the virus is already spreading. The website https://www.fightflu.co.nz has helpful information on this, e.g. people at higher risk qualify for free vaccination. Contact your GP practice to arrange your vaccines, and to discuss any questions.
